The focus of my work currently is primarily portraits of people. I search newspapers and magazines to find faces that portray a strong character and feature an emotional feeling.

Marcia Brager started painting and drawing when she was a teenager but stopped to join the "work world," having been told that she could never support herself as an artist. In the mid-90s, she earned a certificate in graphic design from UCLA, and freelanced as a graphic designer for a short time but decided that she wanted to have an opportunity to exercise her talents in a more creative fashion. In the late 90s, Marcia began producing works of art on the computer, by drawing with a mouse, she also studied painting and sculpture with two local Los Angeles artists. During the same period she was diagnosed with Young Onset Parkinson's, but has continued to paint and draw for the last 20+ years. The act of painting keeps her sane. When she is creating, she feels free of Parkinson's symptoms.




GAIL BUCKLEY

Gail Buckley is 82 years old and has lived with Parkinson's disease for almost 11 years. When diagnosed she was working in clay making, creating large ceramic containers for Ikebana (the Japanese art of flower arranging). Handling the clay eventually became too difficult and she made the leap to two-dimensional art - drawing and watercolor. Never having had any formal training she wanted to start painting immediately. Gail's son, who is the true artist in the family, said: "Mother, you have to learn to draw first." Did she listen? Of course not. But he proved right, and Gail has now taken some classes and workshops and has used YouTube videos to learn more. Currently she is teaching two art classes, Beginning Watercolor and Colored Pencil Art, at the senior independent living facility where she lives.

My work is to communicate ideas, express feelings and tell stories. I especially want to unite and enhance diverse fabric designs and colors with intricate, precision piecing and exorbitant quilting and all the while weave a subtle sermon on the things that delight and confound me. I start with an original rough drawing, draft a straight-line design, and then transfer the design to pattern material. Each piece of cotton fabric is selected, individually precision cut, and sewn together with my 1945 Singer Featherweight machine.



Sandy Yaras was a computer teacher for the Los Angeles Unified School District for twenty years, and developed the first middle school computer repair class in Los Angeles. Sandy was diagnosed with Parkinson's in 2005 and retired from the district a year later. After retirement, he went back to his photography, a previous career of shooting social events. Following his Parkinson's diagnosis he published four books. As one of PCLA's founders, he was instrumental in paving the way for people with PD to openly express their emotions and concerns through his weekly support groups. His gift of PD also allowed him to tap into his creative life and he could occasionally be found doing stand-up comedy. Sandy passed away in 2020 due to heart disease. Following Sandy's passing, PCLA established the "Sandy Yaras Parkinson's Hero Fund," in his memory.
